

**All students have the right to:**

- Make a report to law enforcement and/or state police;
- Have disclosures of domestic violence, dating violence, stalking and sexual assault treated seriously;
- Make a decision about whether or not to disclose a crime or violation and participate in the campus conduct process and/or the criminal justice process free from pressure from the college;
- Participate in a process that is fair, impartial and provides adequate notice and a meaningful opportunity to be heard;
- Be treated with dignity, and to receive from the college courteous, fair, and respectful counseling services as well as assistance in accessing off-campus medical resources. (See Resources for Support below).
- Be free from any suggestion that the reporting individual is at fault when these crimes and violations are committed, or should have acted in a different manner to avoid such crimes or violations;
- Describe the incident to as few college officials as practicable, and not to be required to unnecessarily repeat a description of the incident;
- Be protected from retaliation by the college, any student, the accused and/or the respondent, and/or their friends, family and acquaintances within the jurisdiction of the college;
- Access at least one level of appeal of a determination;
- Be accompanied by an advisor of choice who may assist and advise a reporting individual, accused, or respondent throughout the conduct process, including all meetings and hearings related to such process;
- Exercise civil rights and practice of religion without interference by the investigative, criminal justice, or conduct process of the college.

**Options in Brief****Students have many options that can be pursued at the same time, including:**

- Receiving resources, such as counseling and medical attention;
- Confidentially or anonymously disclosing a crime or violation;
- Reporting an incident to a SUNY Adirondack official, including the Title IX Coordinator, the Dean for Student Affairs, the Director of Human Resources or Campus Public Safety;
- Reporting an incident to local law enforcement, state police, and/or the Campus Sexual Victims Assault Unit.
