Emphases:

The emphases listed below have been suggested by the appropriate division for students who want to transfer to a four-year program in these areas. The Liberal Arts and Sciences elective and the free elective credits within the Liberal Arts/Humanities-Social Sciences degree can be applied toward courses in a chosen emphasis.

FRENCH LANGUAGE: FRN 101, FRN 102, FRN 117, FRN 201, FRN 202, FRN 206

GRAPHIC ARTS: See Media Arts AAS

JOURNALISM: ANT 225; ENG 233 and 12 additional credit hours of ENG 200-level electives; PHI 202; PSC 101 and 102; and a broad range of Liberal Arts and Sciences courses.

PHOTOGRAPHY: See Media Arts AAS

PHYSICAL EDUCATION: See Physical Education Studies AS

SOCIAL SCIENCE: See Anthropology Concentration, Political Science Concentration or Psychology Concentration. Additional emphases are available in History and Sociology.

SPANISH LANGUAGE: SPA 101, SPA 102, SPA 117, SPA 201, SPA 202, SPA 206

THEATER: See Individual Studies AS or THR 101, 102, 105, 106, 210 or equivalent; 3 elective credits from music, visual art or language; Specific course selections to complete the AA or AS degree requirements chosen on an individual basis with advisor.

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
